A VISIT FROM THE BPO





TOP 5 STRATEGIES TO HELP KIDS' BEHAVIORS AT HOME

VISUAL SCHEDULES

Personally, I love visual schedules! One reason kids have trouble transitioning from one task or activity to another is that they don't have a heads up. Its especially hard if they have to transition to something they don't like.

Visual schedules combine pictures with words. They let kids know what to expect during the day.

It's important to review the schedule regularly so that kids know what's coming next, whether it's something they like or not. If there's something they really don't like, make sure to follow up with something they love the next day or following the activity directly.

TIMERS

Timers are a LIFE SAVER. Most kids have a hard time putting down their phones or their video games to do something boring like homework or going to the grocery store. As adults, we have a hard time getting up to go as well. I mean come on, how many of us hit that snooze button when our morning alarm goes off because we "just need 5 more minutes..."

The most important part of a timer if following through. First starting, when the timer goes off there will be a lot of "can I just have 5 more minutes, pleeeeeeease?" It's tough and may get upsetting in the beginning, but the important part is to take [that really awesome thing] away once the timer beeps.

POSITIVE REINFORCEMENT

When some hear this term, they think it's bribery, but it's not! Positive reinforcement means rewarding someone for their hard work. As adults, we get reinforced all the time! How many of us would stay at our jobs if we didn't get a paycheck? Would anyone try to eat healthier if it didn't result in feeling better?

Positive reinforcement means doing something to encourage the child to keep doing what they are doing. Whatever it is, it should always be accompanied by a verbal praise. A simple, "You did a great job focusing on your homework today" will do the trick! Try doing it with just one behavior because you will never remember to reinforce everything.

REALISTIC EXPECTATIONS

Just because kids are the same age doesn't mean they have the same strengths and challenges. Just like adults, kids are individuals and need expectations to be realistic for their individual abilities, you're an expert on your own child, so tailor expectations to what's realistic for your child.

It takes some trial and error, and that's okay. Also remember that some kids need to hear things several times before absorbing what you're saying. Being clear about expectations and repeating them multiple times is always a good idea!

TAKE A BREATH

Remember, Rome wasn't built in a day, so take these steps one at a time. Start with one behavior you want to help change and focus your energies there. When consistently used, these strategies will definitely improve your child's behavior, but it may take a moment to see it. Also change is hard, you could see a behavior get worse before it gets better; but I promise it's worth the wait!

Also give yourself some grace, you're doing your best. It won't be perfect, but it can and will get better! Then go and reinforce yourself for all of your hard work with a bubble bath or a glass of your favorite drink because you deserve to reward yourself too!

TEACHER TYPE-OFF!

As part of the sixth grade Life Skills class, students learn keyboarding through the typing.com website. To gauge their progress, they occasionally take typing tests to see if there have been improvements in their accuracy and words-per-minute. Sometimes, special guests are invited into class to take part in one-minute typing tests, that are meant to be friendly competitions. During the third quarter, many sixth grade teachers along with Principal Benton stopped by Life Skills class to see who was the best typist. Students liked seeing their teachers illustrate how well they could type, after years of practice.
